

As part of this commitment, we are eager to foster greater pupil agency, enabling children to develop the intrinsic motivation necessary to take ownership of their learning in collaboration with us. To support this, we have been exploring the *Engagement Continuum* developed by Australian academic Amy Berry.

We will be introducing this framework to the children to establish a shared language of engagement, allowing us to support them in reaching their full potential.

# PROTECTING YOURSELF AND OTHERS FROM SCAMS ONLINE – SAFER INTERNET DAY 2025

Next week, our school joined others nationwide to celebrate Safer Internet Day 2025, the largest global online safety campaign. This year's theme, 'Too good to be true? Protecting yourself and others from scams online,' focuses on teaching children and young people how to identify and avoid scams, and highlights available support.

Scams can take many forms and target anyone, including young people. You may think that your child would be able to spot an online scammer, but the truth is that they are incredibly convincing and hard to spot. They often involve fake profiles and identities to target people. You may have heard this referred to as 'catfishing.' If your child has been targeted by a scam online and they have been made to do something that they didn't want to, then they are not to blame, they are not in trouble, and support is available.

# Friday Animation Club

Every Friday at lunchtime, we run a small but dedicated animation club. The children have the opportunity to design and create their own animations. Having the creative freedom to choose their own projects has proven to be highly motivational.

Throughout the process, the children have learned to negotiate and work collaboratively to meet deadlines and achieve project milestones. Managing their animation projects has helped them develop a variety of valuable skills.

As the project progresses, they will begin animating their work using computer software and a rostrum camera. They will then learn to record a soundtrack and refine their oracy skills by adding dialogue. Once completed, their film will be shown in assembly and uploaded to our YouTube channel. We will then welcome our second cohort to the club.
